Dear Kim:

Thank you and the other faculty members and students who have agreed to serve on the President's Ad Hoc Committee On a Civil, Safe and Open Environment. I have convened this Committee with a forwardlooking charge. That charge is to develop recommendations on how the University of Florida can best ensure a civil and secure environment at public and UF community events, conducive to a full, free, diverse and lively discourse in the tradition of great academic institutions. The need to review our existing protocols for the conduct and security of events arises in the wake of an incident at Senator John Kerry's talk at UF on September 17<sup>th</sup> that resulted in the tasering and arrest of a student, as well as a heightened awareness of the importance of security on university campuses.

In particular, I ask the Committee to review the University's police protocols, university and ACCENT events management practices, and community conduct policies to come up with a series of recommendations for the conduct and security of events at the University in the future. I ask you to provide the Committee's initial report to me by the end of December 2007.

In addition to any issues the Committee may identify, please consider:

- Existing University policies on conduct of members of the UF community at events, including the code of student conduct.
- 2. Existing UF Police events security protocols, including those relating to the use of tasers.
- Best practices for events conduct and security at peer institutions, including the role and training of moderators and the choice and set up of venue.
- The size of the UF community and the options for security at campus venues of different types and in a variety of circumstances.

The Committee is comprised entirely of faculty and students. Please feel free to call upon others to assist you in fact gathering and for expert consultation. Vice President and General Counsel, Jamie Lewis Keith, is available to provide legal advice and other Vice Presidents and administrators are also available to assist you. Administrative support will be provided for the Committee.

Thank you again for this important service to the University of Florida. 1 will look forward to receiving and carefully considering the Committee's recommendations.



## **Committee on a Civil, Safe and Open Environment**

### **Summary of Recommendations**

Individual behavior, education and training of the UF community to assure a civil, safe and open environment

## A statement regarding the value of free speech at the UF should be crafted and widely disseminated.

Individual behavior, education and training of the UF community to assure a civil, safe and open environment

A tutorial reviewing issues related to free speech on the UF campus should be made available to all members of the university community.

When UF opens a forum/event to the public that involves audience participation it should typically include, at the outset, a brief description of expectations for speakers and audience related to security and free speech.

A website, providing training materials on free speech and the First Amendment, should be developed by UF. Members of the CSOE Committee will serve as advisors as appropriate. Links to the information should be placed on the Dean of Students' and Faculty Senate web sites.


Students and other members of the University community should be made aware of the details of the student conduct code and regulations relating to disruptive behavior, free speech, and the right to dissent. A student-friendly pamphlet, to be handed out at Preview, can help publicize this information among students.

With the support of the Faculty Senate, the UF Board of Trustees should approve modifications to the following UF Regulations: Student Conduct Code, Disruptive Behavior, and Distributing Printed Materials.

**UF** event management

Revised UF event management policy developed by Student Affairs provides pre-event planning, training and the delineation of the roles and responsibilities of event hosts to provide for security and First Amendment speech interests.

The CSOE Committee has reached consensus that this revised event management policy is appropriate and should provide sufficient safeguards to prevent a disturbance from unnecessarily escalating.



UF event management

Training sessions--focusing on event management and security and on protecting First Amendment speech interests relevant to events and areas that are open for public speech at UF--should be held regularly and made available online for all event hosts.

Event hosts may include event managers, event staff, Student Affairs staff, the UFPD, and moderators of events, including but not limited to those involved with large student events.

**UF** event management

Relevant portions of the revised event management policy, developed by Student Affairs, should be shared with all groups hosting events, including faculty, staff and student groups. UF should ensure the policies developed by Student Affairs and ACCENT regarding event management are consistent.

Other groups on campus should be urged to consider adopting parallel guidelines regarding providing security while protecting First Amendment speech interests.

**UF** event management


For ACCENT events, the procedure used to select questions, when a written question format is used, should assure no censorship or appearance of censorship occurs. University of Florida Police Department policies

The CSOE Committee recognizes that, as reflected in the UFPD policy, a taser is an intermediate, less than lethal, weapon, and should be used only when it is appropriate to use an intermediate weapon.

The CSOE committee has reached a consensus that the revised UFPD taser policy, which is more restrictive than State law and more restrictive than the previous UFPD policy, reflects an appropriate use and limitation on use of the taser as an intermediate weapon on campus.



# **Resistance Definitions**

- 1. Presence A subject is on the scene.
- 2. Verbal A subject verbally refuses to comply with your requests or tries to control the situation.
- 3. Passive Physical A subject makes no attempt to physically defeat your actions but forces you to use physical maneuvers to establish control.
- Active Physical The subject may brace or tense himself or herself, try to push or pull away, or not let you come close.
- s. Aggressive Physical A subject makes overt, hostile, attacking movements that may cause injury. However, they are not likely to cause death or great bodily harm to you or others.
- Aggravated Physical A subject makes overt, hostile, attacking movements, with or without a weapon. The person has the intent and apparent ability to cause death or great bodily harm to you or others.

# **Response Definitions**

- 1. Officer presence Officer adopts a stance at a safe distance from the subject.
- Communication Officer conducts a two-way, controlled, unemotional communication with the subject using verbal direction, and if necessary, a soft assisting touch to comfort, console, or gain a subject's attention.
- 3. Physical Control Officer uses restraint devices (handcuffs), physical techniques used by the officer to control, move, and or take-down a subject, the infliction of controlled pain upon specific points of the subject's body such as pressure points, and countermoves that impede a subject's movement toward the officer or another person.


# **Response Definitions**

- 4. Intermediate Weapons Officer uses less than lethal weapons to control a subject.
- Incapacitating Control Officer uses that level of force necessary to stun or render a subject temporarily unconscious or unable to continue to resist.
- 6. Deadly Force Officer uses a level of force that may result in death, great bodily harm, or permanent disfigurement, including strikes to the head with an impact weapon or use of a firearm.

University of Florida Police Department policies

The UFPD should incorporate into its ongoing continuing education program information focusing on providing security while protecting First Amendment speech interests. Continuing education on this subject should be held regularly and should be made available online.

University of Florida Police Department policies

The UFPD's annual report to accrediting agencies, which includes a section on use of force incidents, should be made accessible to the public on the UFPD website.

University of Florida Police Department policies

The UFPD should report to the UF Faculty Senate annually, including information on use of force incidents, parallel to the report currently made annually to the Student Senate. This report should be made accessible on the UFPD website.

University of Florida Police Department policies

The revised UFPD Use of Force policy, which clarifies the circumstances under which tasers are to be used on campus, should be made accessible on the UFPD website. University of Florida Police Department policies

The Use of Force policy should include (if it doesn't already) a provision to the effect that when appropriate use of force is dependent on what a situation "appears" to a police officer to be, this means what the situation appears to a "reasonable police officer' to be under all of the facts and circumstances at the relevant place and time.
